

Privacy Notice (How we use pupil information)

We **Stour Vale Academy Trust** and the individual member schools are joint data controllers for the purposes of Data Protection Law.

Why do we collect and use pupil information?

We collect and use pupil information under the following Acts of Parliament and associated legislation:

The Education Act, amendments and accompanying regulations, for example: Section 537A of the 1996 Act enables the education setting to collect information to perform the Department of Education's termly census.

Section 40(2)(a) of the Childcare Act 2006 - early years foundation stage and Section 87 of the Education Act 2002 - key stage 1 and key stage 2, enables primary age education settings to collect information for the assessing and reporting of the national curriculum.

There are various versions of the Education Act both preceding and following the 1996 Act that have influence on what information is required and how it is processed such as: The Education Reform Act 1988, Further and Higher Education Act 1992, Education Act 1994, School Standards and Framework Act 1998, Teaching and Higher Education Act 1998, Education Act 2002, Higher Education Act 2004, Education Act 2005, Education and Inspection Act 2006 and Education Act 2011, The Education (Pupil Information) England Regulations 2005 and associated regulations and statutory instruments.

We collect and use pupil information for the following purposes:

- to support pupil learning;
- to monitor and report on pupil attainment and progress;

- to provide appropriate pastoral care;
- to assess the quality of our services;
- to keep children safe (food allergies, or emergency contact details);
- to meet the statutory duties placed upon us for DfE data collections; and
- to comply with the law regarding data sharing.

Please refer to the privacy notice of your child's school for a list of any other reasons for which the school collects and uses information about pupils, parents or carers. This information is available on the school website.

The categories of pupil information that we collect, hold and share include:

- personal identifiers and contacts (such as name, unique pupil number, contact details and address);
- characteristics (such as ethnicity, language, gender, religion, date of birth, free school meal eligibility);
- special educational needs (including the needs and ranking);
- safeguarding information (such as court orders and professional involvement);
- medical and administration (such as doctor's information, child health, allergies, medication and dietary requirements);
- attendance information (such as sessions attended, number of absences and absence reasons, any previous schools attended);
- assessment and attainment information (such as EYFS, Key Stage or internal academic assessment information, phonics results);
- behavioural information (such as exclusions and any relevant alternative provision put in place).

Collecting pupil information

Please refer to the privacy notice of your child's school for details of the methods used by the school to collect pupil information.

Whilst the majority of pupil information you provide to us is mandatory, some of it is provided to us on a voluntary basis. In order to comply with data protection legislation, we will inform you, at the point of collection, whether you are required to provide certain pupil information to us or if you have a choice in this, and we will tell you what you need to do if you do not want to share this information with us.

Please refer to the privacy notice of your child's school for the purposes for which the school intends to collect consent to process information. Please note,

you have a right to withdraw consent at any time and can contact your child's school to do this. Please refer to the Fair Processing Notice on the biometric system(s) used in your child's school, where applicable. This information is available on the school website.

In some cases we may process pupil information following the completion of a legitimate interest assessment, e.g. video conferencing for online learning, where this is necessary and desirable for pupils' education.

If you provide us with contact details of others, for example, in case of emergency or when you may not be available, please ensure that they are aware their information has been passed to the school.

We will also receive the above types of personal information, where relevant, from the previous school/nursery and may also receive information from the Local Authority (LA) and the DfE.

Storing pupil data

The information we collect, use and store about pupils and their parents/carers is retained on our computer systems and in paper files, either until it is updated/superseded. When a pupil transfers to another school, we will securely transfer the pupil's educational record and other relevant information to the receiving school to support the child's education, safeguarding and welfare and in accordance with applicable education law, statutory guidance and data protection legislation. Records are retained by a secondary school for the period of 25 years from the date of birth of the child (plus 6 years if SEN information). Who do we share pupil information with?

We routinely share pupil information with:

- Relevant staff within the school and Stour Vale Academy Trust
- schools that the pupils attend after leaving us
- our local authority
- the Department for Education (DfE)
- Health Services

Please refer to the privacy notice of your child's school for a list of other organisations with which the school shares pupil information. This information is available on the school website.

We may use artificial intelligence (AI) within the school's management information system, where this facility exists. AI can also be used for automating administrative tasks, content creation and management, streamlining lesson planning, and through student-facing AI teaching tools and teacher-facing AI tools. This processing is carried out in line with our legal obligations and public

task in delivering education services. AI tools assist staff but do not replace professional judgement, particularly in safeguarding and education and pupil learning decisions. We do not make solely automated decisions that have a significant impact on individuals without informing them and providing appropriate safeguards. All AI use is subject to human oversight, data protection controls, and strict security measures. Where applicable, the school will undertake a data protection impact assessment.

We are committed to working with the local authority in protecting and safeguarding children and young people. As a consequence we intend, where relevant to do so, to share information with safeguarding partner agencies, including the local authority/social care, Police, NHS Trusts and Probation Service integrated into a multi-agency team.

These agencies have a single point of contact for safeguarding concerns. Information about children or young people is shared appropriately and securely in order to take timely and appropriate actions. Information and advice is also provided across a range of child and family services.

Where a pupil/parent/carers has been involved in an accident, an Accident/Incident Report Form will be completed which will include details of the accident including information about you. This information will be held securely in our online and paper systems and in some cases, depending on the severity of the accident, made accessible to the Trust Central Team. In such instances, the information will be accessed by Trust employees, who legally require access to this data, for purposes related to the accident, and may be shared with others to allow us to comply with our statutory duties.

Aged 14+ qualifications

For pupils enrolling for post 14 qualifications, the Learning Records Service will give us a pupil's unique learner number (ULN) and may also give us details about the pupil's learning or qualifications.

Why we share pupil information

We do not share information about our pupils with anyone without consent unless the law and our policies allow us to do so.

We share pupils' data with the Department for Education (DfE) on a statutory basis. This data sharing underpins school funding and educational attainment policy and monitoring.

We are required to share information about our pupils with the DfE under regulation 5 of The Education (Information About Individual Pupils) (England) Regulations 2013.

Youth support services

What is different about pupils aged 13+?

Once our pupils reach the age of 13, we also pass pupil information to our local authority and/or provider of youth support services as they have responsibilities in relation to the education or training of 13-19 year olds under section 507B of the Education Act 1996.

This enables them to provide services as follows:

- youth support services
- careers advisers

A parent or guardian can object to any information in addition to their child's name, address and date of birth being passed to their local authority or provider of youth support services by informing us. This right is transferred to the child/pupil once they reach age 16.

Local Authorities

We may be required to share information about our pupils with the local authority to ensure that they can conduct their statutory duties under

- the Schools Admission Code, including conducting Fair Access Panels.

Department for Education

The Department for Education (DfE) collects personal data from educational settings and local authorities via various statutory data collections. We are required to share information about our pupils with the Department for Education (DfE) either directly or via our local authority for the purpose of those data collections, under:

regulation 5 of The Education (Information About Individual Pupils) (England) Regulations 2013.

All data is transferred securely and held by DfE under a combination of software and hardware controls, which meet the current [government security policy framework](#).

How Government uses your data

The pupil data that we lawfully share with the DfE through data collections:

- underpins school funding, which is calculated based upon the numbers of children and their characteristics in each school;
- informs 'short term' education policy monitoring and school accountability and intervention (for example, school GCSE results or Pupil Progress measures);
- supports 'longer term' research and monitoring of educational policy (for example how certain subject choices go on to affect education or earnings beyond school).

The National Pupil Database (NPD)

Much of the data about pupils in England goes on to be held in the National Pupil Database (NPD).

The NPD is owned and managed by the Department for Education and contains information about pupils in schools in England. It provides invaluable evidence on educational performance to inform independent research, as well as studies commissioned by the Department for Education.

It is held in electronic format for statistical purposes. This information is securely collected from a range of sources including schools, local authorities and awarding bodies.

Sharing by the Department

How to find out what personal information DfE hold about you

Under the terms of the UK Data Protection Act 2018, you are entitled to ask the Department:

- if they are processing your personal data;
- for a description of the data they hold about you;
- the reasons they're holding it and any recipient it may be disclosed to;
- for a copy of your personal data and any details of its source.
